

In response to community requests, the City recently engaged Coolbellup residents to explore footpath lighting options at Mamillius Park. During the feedback period 90 per cent of respondents expressed a desire to improve lighting along the footpath, with the aim of increasing night-time use and improving resident wellbeing.

After listening to our community, in January 2024 we installed the preferred lighting design, featuring solar-powered LED motion-triggered lights. We're proud to see both resident needs and environmental considerations demonstrated in this outcome!

Banjup bushfire 2014:

Reflecting on the day and lessons



Not only were rural areas affected, embers infiltrated residential properties further away from the bushfire, reaching gutters and air conditioning systems left running. Embers can travel up to 40km, so no matter where you live in Cockburn, bushfires are a reality.

More than 200 response personnel assisted during the bushfire, as well as 18 aircraft that dropped 1.7 million litres of water, finally bringing the fire to a close. The Jandakot Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade continued to patrol the area over the following month and attended to flare-ups, common on acid sulphate soils found in Cockburn.

As we reflect on the Banjup bushfire of 2014, it's essential to acknowledge the significant role played by our volunteer firefighters in responding to the event. With National Volunteers Week in May, it is timely to extend our appreciation to these individuals who volunteered their time and continue to support and protect our community.

Lessons learned from the bushfire

The Banjup bushfire taught us valuable lessons, emphasising the need for pre-summer preparedness and having a bushfire plan for your family, property, pets, and livestock:



Create and update your bushfire plan regularly: Discuss roles and responsibilities with your family, including plans for pets and livestock.



Ensure firebreaks are maintained:

Prune trees and remove obstacles above firebreaks, allowing a 4-metre vertical clearance for emergency vehicle access.



Maintain your property:


- Keep gutters clear, remove debris, and store flammable materials and items away from buildings.
- Turn your air conditioner off in the event of a bushfire, as embers can ignite.
- Installing a mesh guard on your air conditioner also helps to keep embers out.





The Private Parking Agreement (PPA) is a new initiative between the City of Cockburn and commercial and strata property owners, aimed at effectively managing parking areas on both private and commercial premises. This approach relieves property owners of the responsibility of managing parking issues themselves.



Commercial and strata property owners (with authority from the Strata Agent) may be eligible to enter a PPA with the City. Owners can also authorise a managing agent to apply on their behalf.

What are the requirements?

If you lease the property or are a managing agent, you'll need to include a letter from the owner giving you permission to act on their behalf for the parking facility.

For strata title land, a managing agent can be recognised in these agreements if most of the owners agree and there's written proof of the appointment. As part of this agreement you'll also have to pay for and put up the right signs following the City's guidelines and approval.

Beautify your garden with a range of native plants available at a discounted rate.

The City's Native Plant Subsidy scheme allows residents to purchase up to 20 native plants from the APACE nursery at 50 per cent of their usual price.

The scheme runs in May and a variety of species will be available, ranging from flowering shrubs to birdattracting trees.

Aside from their natural beauty, native plants carry all sorts of benefits for your garden. They typically require less water — saving on your reticulation. They also attract local birds and fauna and require less maintenance.

CCTV update

Want up to 50 per cent off the cost of your CCTV?

Due to the high demand for our CCTV Rebate program, we are extending it to more households. So get in quick while the rebates are still available.

The program offers rebates of up to 50 per cent off the total cost, to a maximum of \$500, for new or upgraded CCTV systems that meet the minimum requirements. If you paid \$800 for a CCTV system, you would be eligible for \$400 funding from the City.

To qualify, you must be a resident of the City of Cockburn and either the property owner, authorised agent, or tenant with the owner's consent. The location of your cameras must also be registered on the WA Police Force CAM-MAP database.

Apply for the CCTV Rebate program to protect your home and community and help make Cockburn the best place to be. Please read the Terms and Conditions and fill in the Pre-eligibility Form before installing your new or upgraded CCTV system. Visit www.cockburn.wa.gov.au/CCTVHomeRebate

Are you a senior or pensioner?

If you have a valid Seniors or Pensioner Concession Card and live in Cockburn, you may be eligible for our Seniors Security Rebate which supports the installation of a number of security measures including CCTV, alarms, security screen doors, and sensor lights to name a few.

The maximum rebate limit per property per financial year is \$200, except for roller shutters, which have a limit of \$300, and for CCTV, which has a limit of \$500.

More CCTV for Cockburn

Ensuring the safety and security of our residents and businesses is a top priority for the City of Cockburn. That's why we're committed to implementing proactive measures to prevent crime and foster a sense of community wellbeing.

We've heard your feedback for more CCTV cameras and are actively installing over 100 additional cameras in key areas across Coolbellup, Yangebup, South Lake, Spearwood, and Manning Park, as well as more cameras in our community centres. This builds on our existing network of over 700 cameras, making Cockburn one of the most well-monitored councils in WA.

We have been working closely with the WA Police, and our CCTV network has been highly effective in maintaining public safety and aiding in criminal investigations.

These new installations are part of a holistic approach to crime prevention, complementing existing initiatives aimed at empowering our community through awareness and education campaigns.

As we continue to expand our CCTV coverage throughout Cockburn, we encourage residents to remain engaged and provide feedback on areas where additional surveillance may be beneficial. Together we can build a stronger, more resilient community here in Cockburn.



A treasure lost: remembering Bob Pallet, champion of Cockburn's history

Bob Pallet was a true icon of local heritage and a passionate storyteller who brought the community's past to life. Born in 1940 on the corner of what would become Hamilton and Winfield roads, Bob witnessed Cockburn's remarkable transformation to the vibrant city it is today.

More than just a witness, Bob became a dedicated chronicler. His enthusiasm for preserving Cockburn's unique history shone brightly, captivating audiences of all ages with his vivid recollections of bygone times. From lively anecdotes about suburban life to insightful observations on the City's growth, Bob painted a captivating picture of a community evolving while cherishing its roots.

Bob's legacy lives on not only in the meticulously curated museum

exhibits but also in the hearts and minds of those he touched. The City of Cockburn, recognising his invaluable contributions, had the privilege of recording his life story as part of the Cockburn Libraries Oral History Program. Quintessentially Cockburn

Mitchell Garlett Quintessentially Cockburn

In a happy example of history repeating, Mitchell Garlett was appointed Reverend of the Uniting Presbytery of Western Australia's Coolbellup parish – Maaman 'O' Miya – in March 2022.

Ordained in November 2021, Mitchell is following in the respected footsteps of his late father, Rev Sealin Garlett AM, who held the role for more than 20 years until he retired in 2016, passing away in 2019.

Mitchell's familiar soft-spoken influence is enabling the continuation of this successful source of enduring community connection, stamped with his own brand of intuitive leadership that continues his father's legacy of welcoming all people.

A proud Whadjuk Nyungar man, Mitchell arrived in Coolbellup in 1986 with his father and mum, Marilyn (nee Riley), as a three-year-old and has strong country, familial and community connections in the region, making him Quintessentially Cockburn.

He attended the former Koorilla School and graduated Year 12 from the former Hamilton Senior High School, playing hundreds of games of basketball at Wally Hagan stadium and with the Cooby Cats Football Club.



Among Rev Mitchell Garlett's favourite Cockburn places are Coogee Beach, Woodman Point, and the rehabilitated bushland areas in Coolbellup.

Listening and Leading

Reconciliation Action Plan adopted

Cockburn Council endorsed the City's fourth Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) in December 2023, having adopted its first RAP 12 years ago, becoming the first Perth Local Government to do so.

The Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan 2023-2025 outlines specific actions to guide the City as it gains a deeper understanding of its influence and establishes the best ways to advance reconciliation.

City of Cockburn Mayor Logan Howlett said the Innovate RAP would allow flexibility to consolidate foundation work in the areas of employment, cultural learning, and community engagement while 'stretching' the City's work on anti-discrimination and procurement.

"The City continues to plan the Aboriginal Cultural and Visitors Centre in Bibra Lake, investing in cultural competency training for Elected Members and staff, which is so important to reflect our shared values and increase our knowledge of Nyungar heritage, culture and language," Mayor Howlett said.

Environmental Responsibility

Protecting our endangered Fairy Terns

Did you know a precious species of Fairy Tern makes its home along Cockburn's coastline?

The Australian Fairy Tern is a migratory shorebird that is listed as 'vulnerable' in Western Australia (WA). Estimates say there are fewer than 3,000 breeding pairs in WA and at least one-quarter of those birds breed in the broader Perth metropolitan region.

The City is engaged in a number of projects to protect these birds, including the protection of nesting sites at Woodman Point and ongoing initiatives to support Fairy Terns across WA.

Now, you can help too! The City recently developed a Fairy Tern Conservation Guide in collaboration with the

WA Seabird Conservation Network. This guide offers insights into the Fairy Tern's habitat and behaviour, and the crucial steps we can take to protect them.

Belinda the cow on C.Y. O'Connor Beach

It's not every day you see a cow at C.Y. O'Connor Beach, but it was once a regular occurrence.

Chaperoned by a City of Cockburn ranger, Belinda the Jersey Cow strolled along the popular dog exercise area as part of an awareness campaign mounted by Fremantle Seaweed.

Under a Department of Transport lease, Fremantle Seaweed operates a seaweed farm off the beach, trialling native Asparagopsis crops the CSIRO believes reduces livestock methane emissions by more than 90 per cent.

In Australia, methane emissions from livestock are approaching 10 per cent of total greenhouse gas emissions, making burping cows like Belinda a gassy problem in need of a sustainable solution.

As a leader in the blue economy, our City advocates for the sustainable use of ocean resources to create economic growth, improve livelihoods, enhance natural resources and mitigate climate change.

The seaweed farm is a far cry from industrial activities along the Cockburn coast dating back to 1887 when

the first steamships delivered cattle from the Pilbara to Robb's Jetty. the footings of which can still be seen along C.Y. O'Connor Beach.

For a century cattle and sheep were delivered by sea for slaughter at nearby abattoirs. Robb Jetty closed in the early 1990s, paving the way for the redevelopment of North Coogee into a popular residential area and recreation hotspot.


New fit-out for Cockburn Toy Library in Coolbellup

The Cockburn Toy Library (CTL) in Coolbellup recently had a fabulous new fit-out thanks to the Properties Services and Facilities Management teams at the City of Cockburn.

The new space has better air conditioning and flooring, a new paint job, and a spacious shed for the ever-expanding collection of toys. It also has a great new parents' room, providing a comfortable space for feeding, bottle warming and nappy changes.

The CTL, which has branches in both Coolbellup and Atwell, is the largest volunteer-run toy library in WA. With over 2,200 toys to choose from and a community of 215 member families, the CTL has something for every family with children aged 0-7.

Beyond the obvious benefits of cost-saving and access to a wide range of toys, the CTL actively contributes to reducing waste and minimising the City's environmental footprint. This aligns perfectly with the City's broader efforts to foster a greener, more sustainable community.

Big changes are underway at the Malabar Park BMX Facility in Bibra Lake, the home of the Cockburn BMX Club. Currently closed for construction, the facility is undergoing a \$6.88 million redevelopment, which should be completed in late 2024.

So what can our BMX enthusiasts and community expect from the revamped BMX facility?

- A Union Cyclist Internationale BMX racing track. This type of track allows the club to host larger events, bringing riders and supporters from all over Australia to the area. It will also encourage ongoing growth and development of the club
- A new 5m start ramp for training and racing
- New multipurpose facility that includes areas for Cockburn BMX and Friends of the Community Inc.
- A new space for the wider community that includes a pump track, playground, public toilet, and BBQ area

Park BMX Facility will now serve as the home base for Friends of the Community Inc., a local charity dedicated to reinvesting all proceeds from food sales at events back into the local community.

Funding for the \$6.88m redevelopment includes \$6.76m from the City of Cockburn; a \$100,000 grant for floodlighting from the State Government, through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund; and a commitment of \$20,000 from the Cockburn BMX Club upon completion of the project.

The State Government, through the DLGSC is a major supporter of community sport and recreation facilities in Western Australia. Sport and recreation build stronger, healthier, happier and safer communities. When we play sport our whole community wins.
