Refresh for local playgrounds

Over 200 residents recently helped choose playground designs for 10 local parks as part of the City's annual renewal project. The decision around what is replaced each year is based on playground audits.

Residents picked their favourite design from four options for each playground. The options offer updated but similar equipment to the existing playgrounds.

Outcome on Maritime Trail Moorings

The City will push for an expansion of the non-motorised boating area around the Omeo shipwreck, following a recent Council decision.

Almost 250 people had their say in a recent consultation project, which found beachgoers concerned about boats and jetskis near the shipwreck.

Over 70 per cent of respondents opposed trialling moorings in the 8-knot boating zone, due to concerns about swimmer safety. Participants recommended relocating the boating zone further away. Council will advocate for this change to the Department of Transport, which manages boating areas.



Community facilities needs analysis under way

The City has engaged experts in leisure planning to analyse the needs and evaluate the feasibility of enhancing several community facilities.

In early 2023, the spotlight was on Beeliar Reserve and Community Centre, and Tempest Park in Coolbellup, when the City engaged key user groups and nearby residents in discussions regarding their future.

Participants shared their insights on current usage, identified challenges, and highlighted potential opportunities. This feedback, combined with research, is now being used to shape proposals for future upgrades for each location. Further input will be sought from the community.



Shape the beachfront blueprint for Coogee

The City is preparing a master plan (a long-term planning document) for the Coogee Beach foreshore area and wants your input. The master plan will take into account changes to the coastline and help determine where we should invest in the future.

Family memories waiting to be unlocked at Azelia Ley Homestead Museum

The museum is located beside Manning Lake in Hamilton Hill within a 10-room heritage-listed residence built between 1920 and 1923. It was built for Azelia Ley (nee Manning), a member of a wealthy merchant family who developed the park into a farm, orchard and vineyard in the 1860s. But the Mannings are only one small part of our Cockburn story.

You can visit the museum on any Sunday, but join us on Sunday 12 November, 12.30-4pm as we celebrate the Museum's 40th Anniversary. Bring along your precious keepsakes and have them valued. View classic cars, join our Nyungar Yarning Circle, try your hand at solving a History Mystery and listen to Local Legends telling stories of what the Homestead and Museum have meant to them over time.

For a gold coin donation, let furniture, clothing, photographs, art, toys, memorabilia, historical artefacts and farm machinery teach you about the many families, migrants, businesses and community groups that helped establish the Cockburn community.

Bird Hides at Bibra Lake: A haven for birdwatchers and nature enthusiasts

Discover the bird hides at Bibra Lake, a serene haven for birds, their watchers and nature enthusiasts. Nestled among Bibra Lake's beauty, the hides invite you to witness the wetland's remarkable bird diversity.

The Old Boardwalk and Bird Hide and the Narma Kullarck Boardwalk and Bird Hide, form part of the Woodland to Wetland walk trail that begins at The Wetlands Centre Cockburn, 184 Hope Road. This 2.25km trail winds through captivating wetland forests and native flora, offering stunning panoramic views of Bibra Lake.

The hides provide a perfect vantage point for intimate bird observation, whether you're an experienced birder or seeking a nature escape.

Bird Hides

It may have changed beyond recognition for the early settlers, but we have become the powerhouse for engineering and shipbuilding in WA.

I'm very excited with the new \$6.88 million BMX facility at Malabar Park being passed by Council and due for completion in December 2024. This project will be great for all of Cockburn, with a pump track, BBQ facilities and a playground.

Fostering growth and innovation for local businesses

The City is committed to supporting its thriving community of over 9,000 businesses. Initiatives include:

Digital connectivity boost

Becoming the first local government in Western Australia to co-invest in the establishment of an NBN Co Business Fibre Zone in Cockburn Central.

Adventure and leisure tourism

Establishing the Cockburn Destination Advisory Group in 2023 with members representing operators across our region, with the goal of elevating Cockburn to the premier adventure and leisure destination in metropolitan Perth.

Grants to support small business initiatives

Distributing \$100,000 Economic Development Grants of up to \$5,000 to 27 small and medium sized local businesses. Grant applications approved included for enhancing digital capabilities, implementing marketing strategies and purchasing equipment.

Supporting our micro businesses

Hosting events year-round, aimed at fostering a strong network among our micro-business owners and building knowledge. Topics have included website enhancements, finance and marketing initiatives.

Cockburn's Going Global

Running the annual Cockburn Global conference in October in Henderson which provided an excellent opportunity for those interested in exploring export and investment opportunities in Southeast Asia.

Defence, marine and maritime initiatives

Partnering with various organisations to offer initiatives such as Defence Ready Workshops, designed to help businesses prepare their strategy, workforce, and security to tender for local defence contracts.

The City also co-hosted the Defence Industry Employment Connect Event for veterans actively seeking employment and partnered with several organisations to bring EDGE23 — a unique forum attracting experts and innovators tackling marine and maritime engineering challenges.



Cockburn Support Service: Nurturing Community for 30 Remarkable Years!

Thousands of people, including more than 7,000 in the past decade, have received expert help and guidance from Cockburn Support Service, which celebrates its 30th birthday in 2023.

The free service enables clients to access short-term counselling, advocacy, referrals and information.

Established at Coolbellup Hub in 1993, it expanded to Cockburn Health and Community facility in Success, where clients are able to access other essential health services including Medicare, GPs and Centrelink.

The service also offers a range of support groups and workshops to promote connection and personal growth.

These include:

Wise Women Workshops: Empowering women aged 45 and above. Sessions delve into various topics, including wellbeing, mindfulness, heart health and assertive communication

My Time (Ngaany Djang): A space for Aboriginal parents and caregivers to share experiences, nurture connections and forge friendships over a friendly yarn

Beeliar Hub Parents Group: An inviting haven for parents and young children, fostering community ties and a vibrant social circle

Baby Makes 3: A nurturing workshop that guides parents through the transformative journey of adapting to life with a new baby

One of the service's early family counsellors, dating back to 1998, was current City of Melville CEO and former City of Cockburn Chief of Community Services Gail Bowman.

"To see an individual in crisis move to a situation where they were in a better place mentally and physically, and then be able to become a volunteer and participate in social groups and then help lead the groups, was amazing and so rewarding," Ms Bowman said.

City of Cockburn Family and Community Services Manager Linda Walker said.

"It's true to say that Cockburn Support Service has been a lifeline for some, but it's also a vital conduit to a broader network of resources and services," Ms Walker said.

"Cockburn Support Service has been a symbol of community strength, resilience and unity. As we celebrate this milestone, we honour the countless lives transformed and the bonds nurtured."

For properties smaller than 4,047m²





Cut long grass or weeds to a maximum height of 50mm

When can you burn?

If you own a rural property permits are required for burning on your rural property in October, November, April, and May. Burning is NOT allowed from December through to March.

Community, Lifestyle and Security

Your role in making Cockburn safe

CoSafe plays a vital role in enhancing community safety in Cockburn. The team patrols 24/7, 365 days a year, but safety is a collaborative approach involving the City, WA Police, residents and businesses.

It is also extremely important to report any incidents you witness, as each piece of information helps create a clearer picture, like the pieces of a jigsaw puzzle.

When reporting incidents, details count:

Describe people from top to bottom, as you will be able to gather information in an order you can remember

Faces reveal the most, as they have more detail

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When recalling vehicles, start with the license plate. Note the make, model, colour, and any unique traits or damage to the vehicle.

Although CCTV cameras are prevalent, they may not capture all incidents. In situations where it's safe to do so, individuals are encouraged to take photos or videos of incidents and promptly share this evidence with relevant authorities. This information can be critical for investigations.

Sporting Hall of Fame open for nominations

Do you know a local sporting legend who deserves recognition?

Nominations for the City of Cockburn's prestigious Sports Hall of Fame opened on Monday 6 November 2023.

The City's Hall of Fame celebrates outstanding achievements of local Cockburn athletes and sports administrators, past and present, along with the junior clubs that helped develop their talents.

Over 20 athletes have been inducted so far, ranging from AFL legends Glen Jakovich and Peter Sumich, to champion lawn bowler Steve Srhoy and to renowned sports commentator George Grljusich.

Both junior and senior athletes are eligible if they have competed in the open age category of an elite competition.

Sports administrators can be any individual who contributes to sport behind the scenes.

Nominees can be deceased or living and must have been a resident of Cockburn for five years or more.

The Hall features at two locations in the City, one at the City's administration building lining the pillars of the walkway leading to the Council Chambers and one inside the Cockburn ARC.

Turtle Tracker Joyce walks the volunteering talk

Joyce Gadalon lives in North Lake and until three years ago, despite many walks around her neighbourhood lake, had never seen a southwestern snake-necked turtle (Chelodina oblonga).

That all changed in 2020 when she saw a tiny turtle heading towards a sandy patch and watched it dig a hole and lay her eggs.

It was love at first sight.

"It all made sense to me then. It became really obvious how vulnerable these creatures are, especially during a mass movement event. That can be quite hectic," Joyce said.

Joyce is now a Turtle Tracker volunteer and can proudly report that, even before the onset of the 2023-24 turtle nesting season, she has seen well over 50 of the creatures the Nyungar community call Yaakan, Booyi or Choonya.

She learned about the citizen science turtle tracking crews through City of Cockburn calls for people to attend information sessions.

"I'd never seen one of these turtles at my lake so I thought I'd go along to an info session to learn more about these elusive creatures, and I ended up doing the Turtle Tracker training," she said.

"When I first saw one I was just in disbelief, and very excited.

"It's a real privilege to see them do what they have been doing for centuries, in our own backyard. It's really special and actually quite addictive to see them dig a nest and bury their eggs.

"Nesting time is when they are so vulnerable, particularly during mass movement events, going across roads and gathering in large numbers. That is when they are unprotected against cars, foxes, ravens, dogs and cats.

"We want them to lay eggs to hopefully create future generations. That's why it's important to have trained Turtle Trackers on hand to help protect them as they nest."

Joyce said she was grateful for the opportunity to "think globally and act locally", experiencing many benefits that had enriched her life.

Apart from learning about the turtles' plight and their vulnerability due to urbanisation and predation, she was acutely aware of the value of volunteering and how it could make a real difference

She had also begun recognising the interconnectedness of our natural environments, discovering Kwenda, tiger snakes and other local native creatures in her own neighbourhood.

Joyce is also doing a lot more walking, enjoying the fresh air of the outdoors, and making new friends with fellow Turtle Trackers who she describes as "beautiful human beings".

"Becoming a volunteer Turtle Tracker has made me a better person. I've also met some of the most empathetic and supportive people who really know how to work together to achieve great things. I highly recommend it."

Snorkelling and diving are fantastic ways to get up close and personal with these wonders.

However, it is important to remember that sea life and underwater structures can be both dangerous and fragile. It is best to snorkel responsibly.

Here are a few handy hints:

Green Tick

Explore with your eyes and camera

Climb and rest on buoys and pontoons

Take your rubbish home or to a bin

Bring a floating device if you aren't a strong swimmer, so you can rest in the water

Red Cross

Climb on the 100-year-old shipwreck

Touch things that are precious and fragile

Take pieces of living ecosystems or heritage-listed structures

Make sure your containers are free of food or liquid before putting them in the recycling.



Tiss-ews

Please put tissues and paper towel in the general waste bin.



3. Scrunch your plastics

Not sure if your plastic waste is a soft or hard plastic? Scrunch it up. If it bounces back, it is safe to recycle. If it stays scrunched, it's a soft plastic and needs to go in general waste.



4. Aerosols and batteries

Aerosols and household batteries don't belong in the bin (either red or yellow). The City has drop off points for these at all City libraries, Cockburn ARC, Cockburn Gateway and The Wetlands Centre Cockburn.



What is e-waste?

Anything with an electric cord is considered e-waste and can be disposed of free of charge at Henderson Waste Recovery Park or Bulk Verge Collection (when separated).
