

Cockburn's GREAT Gang – the subjects of a new waste education campaign with a twist.

The Nyungar season of Kambarang (October to November) is upon us, providing great opportunities to explore our banksia woodlands, wetlands and coastal features. Walks in any of these locations bring us closer to nature, with spectacular displays of balgas, acacias, wildflowers and fungi, birds singing in the trees and many of our reptiles coming out of hibernation.

I often say that to fully appreciate the wonders around us when out walking you need to stop, close your eyes and absorb the atmosphere – it can be quite surreal at times. The many lakes that showcase the abundance of nature can be observed for hours, as can the wildflowers coming into flower in our banksia woodlands. Spider orchids provide spectacular displays if you find them. For those who look more carefully at the areas shaded from the sun, you'll find some amazing specimens of fungi. All colours, shapes and sizes provide an interesting and important element to our natural environment.

Our coastal features continue to be a source of continuous change, being shaped by the wind, rain, waves and humans. I encourage everyone to observe any signage and, in particular, stick to allocated pathways through the dunes.

Of course, with spring comes the birth of young birds (or chicks) who emerge from their nests ready to eventually take flight. Most of us will be aware of the swooping magpies protecting their nests and young in our local parks, banksia woodlands and even in our own properties where they take up residence. Please spread the message to make everyone aware of the dangers of being out and about during this time.

On behalf of Elected Members, I thank our staff and volunteers for their passion and commitment to the many challenges that present themselves on a daily basis in terms of our environment.

Illegal dumping and littering cost ratepayers \$1.5m a year

Illegal dumping and littering are an offence that costs ratepayers and the City approximately \$1.5m a year in clean-up costs and resources. Illegal dumping is anything that can fit into the size of a small trailer. Anything less is littering. If you see someone illegally dumping their goods, please call the Pollution Watch Hotline on 1300 784 782 (24 hours).

Illegal dumping is not only an eyesore for residents, it can also attract vermin and other scavenging animals to the area. Over time, this can negatively impact local property prices. Dumping of hazardous waste can also affect the environment if it is not contained correctly and can be dangerous for residents – especially children.

If offenders are caught and prosecuted they face fines, clean-up, and court costs ranging from approximately \$1,000-\$62,500 for individuals and up to \$125,000 for businesses. Offenders' details, including business details, are also made public.

Where can I dispose of my bulk waste?

All ratepayers in Cockburn receive six trailer passes per year to the Henderson Waste Recovery Centre (HWRC). Renters also have the right to ask their landlord for their trailer passes otherwise it costs \$50 per load per car or \$65 for a utility or trailer not exceeding 1m³. \$50 is much less than paying up to \$125,000 in fines and costs! Note that tyres can also be disposed of at the HWRC.

The City's robust leadership has continued to evolve in the last quarter of 2022 as an experienced threemember team shares the role of acting Chief Executive Officer until a permanent candidate is appointed which could take up to 12 months.

On Thursday 1 September, Executive Corporate Affairs Victoria Green made City of Cockburn history by becoming the first woman to take on the CEO role.

Ms Green will continue in the role until the end of October when Chief of Operations Anton Lees will step up for two months, followed by Executive Governance and Strategy Emma Milne in January and February. The two-month rotation is part of the Council endorsed arrangement which will continue until an appointment is made.

Coolbellup is sporting a new mural, and it brightens up the whole community.

After years of ongoing graffiti on the Len Packham Clubrooms, the City – with the Coolbellup Resident Association – decided to try a mural approach to reduce graffiti.

Step in, local Noongar artist Amanda Hart. More than 300 community members voted for Amanda to create Coolbellup's newest artwork. Amanda worked with the Coolbellup community to inform the design for the mural.

The final design represents both Coolbellup and Bibra Lake with a Noongar theme featuring the long-neck turtle. The mural also features the words 'Moort Danjoo Whadjuk Boodja' which means 'Family Together on Noongar Country'– words that remind us that family is important and significant. Len Packham Park often hosts Noongar families that come together to celebrate the lives of their loved ones.

Amanda painted stones and left them by the mural for local children to find and take home as a memory of the mural.

"The mural was inspired by my Aunty Marline, a Cooby Elder, who always tells me yarns about when they used to go to Bibra Lake. [They'd] catch turtles for a good feed – they'd catch them and throw them in the hot coals to cook." Amanda Hart, artist.

Register your dog or cat before the end of October

All dogs over three-months-old must be registered and microchipped by law. Cats over six-months-old must be registered, microchipped and sterilised. Registration is due by Monday 31 October 2022 and we offer lifetime, three-year, or annual registrations. Why do I need to register and microchip my pet?

- Our rangers have a better chance of returning your pet safely if they go missing
- We can provide the right type of services and facilities for your pet
- It is the law and fines over \$200 may be issued if your pet is unregistered.

Don't forget that your pet needs to be microchipped by a vet before they can be registered. Your pet's microchip details are stored on a national database, which helps our rangers to return your pet if it's lost. To retrieve the microchip details, please call your vet.

Fight the bite

With the rainfall experienced this winter, we can expect mosquitoes out in force in the warmer weather.

In WA alone we have more than 100 different species of mosquito, some of which will carry disease-causing viruses like Ross River Virus.

The City monitors the mosquito population closely and works with the Department of Health to control outbreaks.



Mosquitoes lay their larvae in still or stagnant water, so they are attracted to lakes and wetlands. While the City treats sumps, soak wells, road drains, and other man-made water bodies to prevent breeding, there are things you can do to protect yourself and your home:

- Cover up with long, loose-fitting clothing
- Use a repellent containing DEET (diethyltoluamide) or picaridin
- Empty, remove or cover water-holding containers
- Install insect screens on windows and doors
- Use mosquito nets and mosquito-proof tents when camping
- Make sure your pool is chlorinated, and the filtration system is active.

Revitalising our well-loved playgrounds

Did you know there are more than 200 playgrounds in Cockburn?

Every year a number of these playgrounds reach the end of their life and require new equipment to be installed. In this financial year, 14 playgrounds across nine suburbs will receive replacement equipment.

To ensure the playground equipment meets the needs of the local community, the City produces three design options for each playground and asks residents which design they prefer. This annual project replaces end-of-life equipment with new, like-for-like versions – it doesn't include significant changes or additions to the playground.

In June, we went out to residents asking which design they preferred. To find out which designs were chosen for playgrounds in Aubin Grove, Beeliar, Coogee, Hamilton Hill, Lake Coogee, South Lake, Spearwood, Success and Yangebup visit

New Fire Danger Rating system

There is a new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) in place, which is part of a national project to ensure fire danger ratings are communicated in the same way across Australia.

Fire danger ratings tell us how dangerous a bushfire could be, based on factors like the weather and the types of vegetation in the area, and also what to do.

What's changed?

The new AFDRS is simpler and more action-driven, so you know exactly what you should do to help protect yourself and others from bushfire.

The new AFDRS levels include:

MODERATE – plan and prepare

- Most fires can be controlled
- Check your bushfire plan.

HIGH – be ready to act

- Fires can be dangerous
- Decide what you will do if a fire starts. Review your bushfire plan.

EXTREME – take action now to protect your life and property

- Fires will spread quickly and be extremely dangerous
- Put your bushfire plan into action. If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, plan to leave early.

CATASTROPHIC – for your survival, leave bushfire risk areas.

- If a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost
- It may be too late to make a bushfire plan. Prepare your emergency kits and choose where you will go and different ways to get there. Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.



There is also a new 'no rating' for days where no proactive action is required.

How's your fire prevention preparation going?

With the hot weather just around the corner, now's the time to start putting measures in place to protect your property and help keep your family safe. Whether your property is in suburbia, near a park or reserve, or in a rural area, everyone needs to prepare for the summer fire season.

How can I protect my house and family?

Properties smaller than 4,047m²

- Cut long grass or weeds to a maximum height of 50mm
- Remove dead vegetation.

Properties larger than 4,047m²

- Firebreaks (3m wide cleared surface inside the external property boundary) should be in place from 1 November to 15 April
- Prune overhanging branches to provide a 4m high vertical clearance above the firebreak
- Remove dead vegetation 3m wide around houses, sheds and other structures.

When is burning permitted?

If you own a rural property, you need a permit to burn on your property in October, November, April, and May. Burning is prohibited from December to March inclusive.

There are six videos in the series, five of these focus on individual characters based on the State Waste Authorities' **GREAT** acronym for reducing waste –

Giving, Recycling, Earthcycling, Avoiding, and Taking.

Each video provides helpful tips for how to reduce personal waste with some laughs sprinkled in for good measure.

Waste reduction is a priority for the City, with finite landfill space declining and levies climbing. Reducing the amount of waste going to landfill saves the City (and our ratepayers) money and it saves the environment from harm.

The campaign has been primarily funded by a grant from the State Waste Authority.

Top tips for recycling

- Soft plastics cannot go in your recycling bin.
- This includes plastic bags, plastic food wrap, food packaging such as pasta, rice and cereal bags, and bubble wrap – any plastic that is 'scrunchable'.
- These types of plastics get caught in the recycling conveyer belt, which can cause the entire system to shut down.
- However, soft plastics can be easily recycled at a REDcycle collection bin found at many supermarkets. They are transformed into a unique range of recycled-plastic products including furniture, bollards and signage.

Crushing facility for Bibra Lake not going ahead

The development of a proposed crushing facility for Bibra Lake will not go ahead.

Council voted to refuse the development, citing concerns about the management of asbestos, dust and noise at the facility's proposed location within 500 metres of residential houses.

The company involved appealed the City's decision to the State Administrative Tribunal and then

recently withdrew their appeal following acceptance of a third-party offer to purchase the site.

Snorkel responsibly this summer

Remember to explore with your eyes and not your hands when swimming at the Coogee Maritime Trail.

Summer is just around the corner and that means it's nearly time to hit the beach.

The Coogee Maritime Trail at Coogee Beach is an award-winning coastal attraction comprising an underwater dive and snorkel trail and a land-based trail. The trail is perfect for swimmers, snorkelers and lovers of maritime history and underwater life.

The jewel of the trail is the Omeo shipwreck. Resting just 25 meters off shore, the now haunting and coralencrusted wreck is what remains of a 163-year-old English iron steamship.

However, the wreck is extremely vulnerable to damage and has been degrading in recent years.

A major cause of this is misuse. It's important to remember that the wreck is not a pontoon or diving platform. When swimmers climb on it, the wreck breaks and collapses in parts. The Omeo is federally protected and standing on or taking parts of the wreck without a permit is an offence under the Commonwealth Underwater Cultural Heritage Act 2018.

If you plan to visit the Coogee Maritime trail this summer, please be a responsible snorkeler.



Picturesque attraction grows

Located on a gorgeous strip of coastline, the Port Coogee Marina is one of Cockburn's most prized facilities. The marina's dedication to clean water and healthy sea life has earned the facility international accreditation.

In 2016 the City began expanding the marina through a multistage process, with a vision to create a destination worthy of our beautiful beaches.

The third stage of this expansion was completed in September 2022, with the addition of 69 new boat pens spread across three new concrete floating jetties.

The Bellingham Unifloat jetties are an innovation with a 50+ year design life. Port Coogee is one of the first marinas in Western Australia to install this design.

Other new features include a 90-metre waterfront timber boardwalk, a new loading berth area, two gatehouses serving the new jetties, motion-activated jetty lighting, and boardwalk seating made from jarrah recycled from the Coogee Beach jetty.

Upgrades to the Marina Services Building, including the creation of a downstairs lounge, will be carried out in 2023.

The upgrades and extensions included two new unisex change rooms, an umpire room, a first aid room, improved storage, and upgrades to the existing kitchen and clubroom space. New lighting and CCTV will allow the community to safely use the reserve at night.

The project was funded by the State Government and the City, with \$220,000 coming from the State through a Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSCI) 'Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund' grant and an additional \$350,000 via an election commitment by Fremantle MLA Simone McGurk. The City funded \$485,516.

The State Government, through the DLGSC, is a major supporter of community sport and recreation facilities in Western Australia. Sport and recreation builds stronger, healthier, happier and safer communities. When we play sport, our whole community wins.

New nature play area in Atwell

Tapper Park in Atwell now has a new fenced nature play area thanks to State Government funding of \$50,000.

In partnership with the City, Member for Cockburn David Scaife MP engaged with the local community who expressed a need for nature play elements suitable for young children. The Atwell Community Association and residents were actively involved in creating the design of the nature play area which includes a double swing, tightrope, balance log, timber steppers and interactive play panels – perfect for the kids and a great outcome for the local community.
