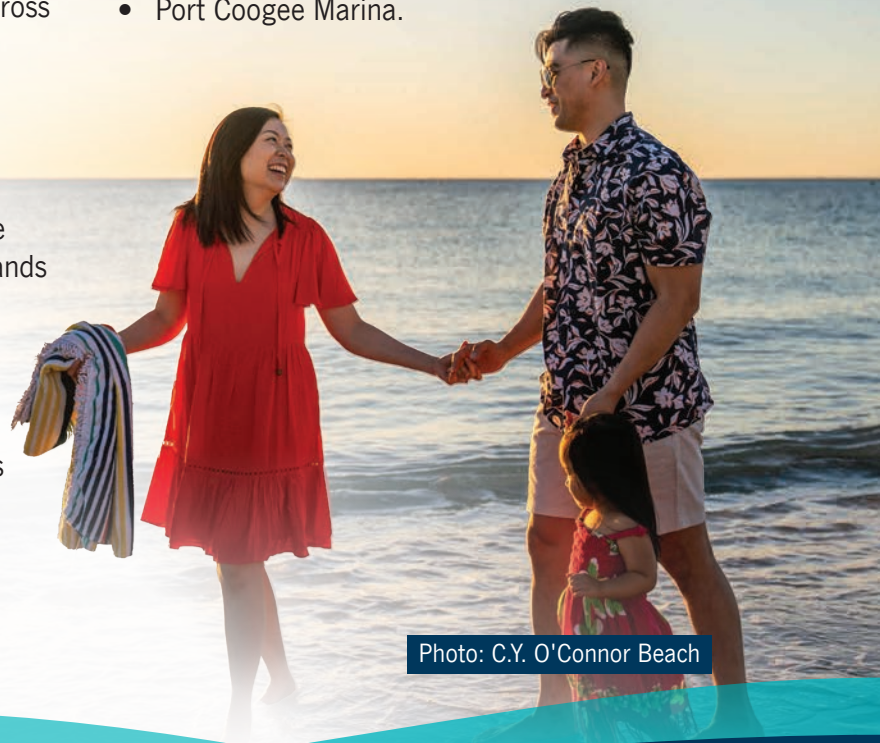

Sporting elite recognised

Cockburn's sporting elite gathered in April to celebrate 14 new inductees to the Cockburn Sports Hall of Fame.



Colin Beard (1941–2019) – Australian Rules Football

Colin played 167 games for South Fremantle Football Club before joining Richmond Football Club, where he was part of the 1969 VFL Premiership team.



Roger Hayden – Australian Rules Football

A member of the 2007 All Australian Squad and 2019 Fremantle Football Club's Best 25 since '95, Roger spent nine seasons after a 12-year playing career as development coach with the club.



Ashtyn Hiron – Lacrosse

After securing an American college scholarship to play lacrosse, Ashtyn has represented Australia at four World Cups, as well as in the World Games for those sports not played in the Olympics.



Jason Petkovic – Soccer

Widely regarded as Perth Glory's greatest goalkeeper, Jason played 177 games for the club and 16 games as goalkeeper with the Socceroos.



Madison de Rozario OAM – Para-athletics

A Paralympian and the first Australian woman to win the New York City Marathon, Madison was named Athlete of the Year at the 2022 Women in Sport Awards, with an impressive tally of Paralympic and Commonwealth Games medals.



Marianna Tabain – Soccer

A foundation member of Perth Glory, Marianna kicked 20 goals over her career with the team from 2008 to 2021 and is a 2015 Women's League Premiership winner.



Michael Petkovic – Soccer

Goalkeeper for the Socceroos, Michael was awarded National Soccer League Goalkeeper of the Year three times between 1998 and 1999.



Nathan Jones – Softball

Inducted into the Softball Australia and Softball Western Australia Halls of Fame, Nathan won gold at the World Championships, followed by a substantial career coaching Australian men's and women's senior teams.



Ritchie Smith – Golf

Two-time PGA Australia Coach of the Year and eight-time PGA Western Australian Coach of the Year, Ritchie was awarded the 2022 SportWest Coach of the Year.



Robbie Gaspar – Soccer

Robbie played with the Football Association of Malaysia and the Indonesian Premier League and is active in sports diplomacy and player management.

Stephen Hill – Australian Rules Football

Stephen played for the Fremantle Football Club between 2009 and 2021, winning the AFL Rising Star Award in 2009 and 2019 Fremantle Football Club's Best 25 since '95.



Tom Bottrell – Australian Rules Football

Kicking 57 goals across 200 WAFL games while playing 12 seasons with South Fremantle Football Club, Tom is a 1997 WAFL Premiership Winner with an extensive post-playing career in sports administration.

Students learned about road safety when riding or walking to school, graffiti, personal safety, looking out for

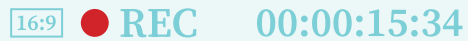

CCTV Project to enhance public safety

We’ve finished installing additional CCTV cameras throughout Coolbellup, Manning Park, Yangebup Pump Track and South Lake, as the first part of a five-year, \$1.6m citywide program to increase our community’s sense of security.

The exact timeline for further suburbs depends on the City’s annual budget. Once the five-year project is finished, the City will have approximately 1,400 CCTV cameras placed around Cockburn.

We also maintain a collaborative relationship with WA Police, sharing information and CCTV intelligence to assist in criminal investigations. This helps ensure a coordinated approach to maintaining a safe environment for everyone in Cockburn.

Get up to 50 per cent off the cost of your CCTV

The new round of funding for the CCTV Home Rebate is now open, so if you want to take your own security a step further, apply for the City’s CCTV Home Rebate Program and get up to 50 per cent off a new or upgraded CCTV system (maximum rebate \$500). Seniors can access the Seniors Security Rebate for a wider range of security options, including CCTV (up to \$500 rebate), roller shutters (up to \$300) and alarms, sensors or security screens (up to \$200 rebate).

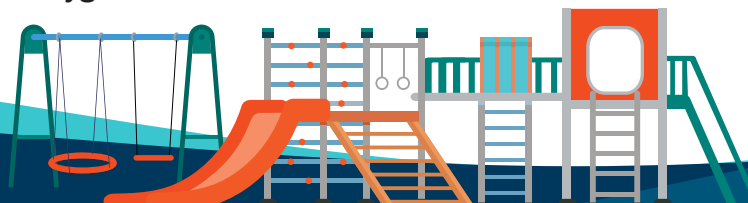

Puppyhood to adulthood: what you need to know

Just like children, puppies undergo several distinct developmental stages before they mature and are fully grown. Understanding these stages and providing the right care and attention provides the best environment to ensure your puppy grows into a well-adjusted adult dog.

1 month

Puppies will stick close to mum and the litter. Keep them safe and comfortable.



1-3 months

- Your puppy will begin to walk and explore
- Introduce basic training commands
- Expose them slowly to places, people, sights and sounds
- Vaccinate at 6-8 weeks and 10-12 weeks to build and strengthen their immune response.



3-6 months

Pups begin to wander further afield and are interested in socialising.

- Register your puppy
- Start obedience training
- Booster shots at 14-16 weeks.



6-18 months

Puppy teens will start to test boundaries.

- Undertake behaviour training to ensure they have good recall.



1-7 years

- Continue obedience training and socialisation as they are lifelong activities to maintain healthy relationships with dogs and people
- Regular vet check-ups
- Annual or triennial booster shots.



Understand your dog's bark and body language

Like toddlers each dog has their own personality. Understanding your dog's behaviour can strengthen your bond and make life easier.

1. Recognise your dog's communication cues

A tucked in tail, lowering of ears and excessive barking are obvious communication cues. Subtle cues like lip licking, showing the whites of their eyes, avoiding eye contact, and yawning can indicate they're anxious, scared, or bored.

2. Introvert or extrovert?

Some dogs get nervous around strangers. It's best not to force interactions - it will help avoid distress.

3. Dogs and children

Teaching children to say hello safely, understand cues and respecting boundaries will set them up for a positive lifelong relationship with dogs.

4. Etiquette in dog exercise areas

Understanding your dog's comfort level in busy areas is crucial for the safety of your dog, other dogs, and people. Move to a quieter area if your dog shows signs of discomfort. Dogs can become protective of their belongings. Avoid bringing these items into enclosed dog parks.

5. Barking dogs

If they won't stop barking, they could be telling you that they are nervous, excited or bored, or it could be a sign of separation anxiety.

Call out for citizen scientists

We're looking for turtle tracker volunteers for the 2024 nesting season.

You'll be part of the Saving Our Snake-necked Turtles (SOSNT) citizen science project, in partnership with Murdoch University and the Harry Butler Institute, which now involves nearly 20 other local governments in Perth and Western Australia's South West.

The program relies on volunteers to help track, monitor and protect the near-threatened southwestern snake-necked turtle (*Chelodina oblonga*) during the nesting season when females leave the water to lay their eggs.

The snake-necked turtle, which the Nyungar community call Yaakan or Booyi, are found in lakes and wetland areas across Cockburn, including Manning and Bibra Lakes.

As a volunteer, you will be trained to record turtle and nest sightings and learn how to protect nesting females on the move and their nests.

Your help could be a key part of saving the species as it adapts to our urban environment.

Tiny beetle, big problems

Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) is a tiny yet invasive beetle causing big problems in urban forests in the Perth metro area.

About the size of a sesame seed, PSHB was first reported in WA in 2021 and has been known to infest over 400 plant species. It will bore tunnels in trees and cultivate a *Fusarium* fungus as a food source, which disrupts the flow of water and nutrients around the tree causing branches, and even whole trees, to die.

Early detection and the prompt removal or pruning of infested trees is key to containing the spread of PSHB and minimising further impact to neighbouring trees. How do you find a beetle that is only the size of a sesame seed? You look for these main symptoms:

- **Beetle entry/exit holes** roughly the size of a ballpoint pen tip
- When pruning branches or inspecting fallen branches, check for evidence of **galleries** caused by tunnelling beetles
- **Discoloration/staining**
- **Thick resin or sap**
- **Frass** or “noodles” caused by tunnelling may be seen on the tree exterior, indicating a high level of infestation
- **Sugar volcanoes**, crystalline foam exuded from entry/exit holes, are a common sign of infestation on Avocado trees
- **Dieback and tree death.**

If you notice any of these symptoms or anything unusual on a tree in your suburb, take a photo and report it to the Western Australian Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development as soon as possible and send to

What is your number one spare time activity?

The number of projects per suburb varies each year, new suburbs require new parks and facilities, and larger suburbs usually have more projects happening. Active ARC members save millions in community health costs

Are you an active member at Cockburn ARC? If you answered yes, it's likely you helped save our community nearly \$30 million in health costs across 2021-22 and 2022-23.

The regular activity of ARC members reduced the risk of 10 major acute and chronic health conditions and diseases including mental health conditions, cardiovascular disease, type-2 diabetes, breast and bowel cancer, and dementia in the community.

Sanford Gadomski became an ARC member in 2018 while recovering from a serious car accident. He credits the facility with changing his life, enabling him to improve his physical and mental health with a gym circuit five days a week.

Cockburn ARC partners with ActiveXchange, a Sydney-based company that provides data intelligence to help organisations and facility operators make evidence-based decisions to grow active and healthy communities.

Aligned with Federal Government and Australian Institute of Health and Welfare guidelines, its social value data shows a predicted dollar value saving of members' activity levels and how it reduces the risk of acute and chronic health indicators on a community-scale.

The ARC, including its spin studio, gym, and group fitness areas, is undergoing a major revamp due for completion in 2025.

Upgrades kicking off at Santich Park, Lake Coogee

The City is set to upgrade Santich Park in Lake Coogee, addressing the needs of local sporting clubs including the South Coogee Junior Football Club and Cockburn Little Athletics Club, as well as the broader community.

The project will take place in two stages. Stage one, starting soon and concluding by the end of 2024, will focus on upgrading the sporting ground. Stage two will involve enhancements to the buildings, with the timeline yet to be determined.

Stage 1:



More sports lighting

Australian Standard lighting will be installed around the southern oval, extending playing hours and enhancing safety.



Safer parking

Perimeter railings will be realigned to prevent cars from encroaching the road, improving traffic flow and pedestrian safety.



Better layout

The discus throw circles will be relocated for better space utilisation and functionality.



More parking

A new 45-bay carpark will be added in the ground's north-eastern area (near Shelley Way), helping to ease parking congestion.

The total cost of Stage 1 is \$1.76 million, with \$1.66m from the City of Cockburn and \$99,790 from the State Government's Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund.

The State Government, through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, is a major supporter of community sport and recreation facilities in WA. Sport and recreation builds stronger, healthier, happier and safer communities. When we play sport, our whole community wins.
